EAST TOSA BUSINESSES PIVOT DURING PANDEMIC

As the COVID-19 pandemic has changed our daily lives over the past 11 months, businesses in and around Tosa East Towne have been heavily impacted as well. But many have managed to drastically adapt their practices to forge ahead in the new normal, demonstrating creativity and innovation.

Among them is Pilgrim Child Development Center, or PCDC, at

7011 W. Center St. PCDC reopened on June 1 with new procedures in place, including twice-daily temperature checks for both staff and children, said Nikki Strege, center director.

"Our enrollment was incredibly low in the first few months, which led to changing staff responsibilities and allowed us to maintain new sanitizing procedures," Strege said. "Our staff



BOARD ADJUSTS TETNA EVENT SCHEDULE

The coronavirus pandemic upended a full cycle of TETNA events over the past year, but we entered 2021 with some hope of an eventual return to in-person activities and resumption of some of our neighborhood's most popular events.



We are happy to announce that Beth Jaworski of Shorewest Realtors has again committed to sponsoring our Neighborhood Rummage Sale. A final decision has not been made about whether that event will resume on the first Saturday in June, as is customary, or a later date. Watch for further



TETNA also is eager to bring back Run Tosa Run, likely either as a virtual 5K in May or as an in-person event scheduled later in the year. A decision should be coming soon.

As for the annual Spring Egg Hunt, the TETNA board voted in January to cancel that event for the second year, due to continued public health concerns, difficulty of scheduling events with Milwaukee County Parks and overall uncertainty about COVID-19 trends in the next couple months.

continues to rotate and sanitize toys when a child is finished playing with it."

Rocket Baby Bakery, 6822 W. North Ave., was among the TETNA restaurants that adapted to safely get food to customers.

The popular bakery added tape on the sidewalk to help walk-up customers keep their distance in line on busy weekend mornings. It began taking walk-up orders at the door instead of bringing customers inside. And Rocket Baby also implemented online ordering, for curbside pickup or delivery within the neighborhood.

Other restaurants along North Avenue have implemented similar measures, emphasizing takeout and delivery options while producing new quarantine-ready menu items, from Cranky's donut-making kits to BelAir Cantina's "make your own nachos." North Avenue Grill took advantage



of its outdoor seating during the summer. Hue Vietnamese doubled down on online ordering.

"Thank you all for helping us find a place in this brave new world," Rocket Baby said in a May social media post. "We are not sure what is coming next, but we will be happy as long as we get to bake."

At Fancy Pants Pet Salon, 6421 W. North Ave., owner Erin Hennen also implemented changes to help keep customers and staff safe. Hennen herself was diagnosed with breast cancer three days after the business shut down due to the pandemic, so she has been

especially careful with her compromised immune system.

Fancy Pants moved its kennels to the front of the retail area so customers could have contactless pick-up and drop-off. Hennen also implemented online payments.

"We are really lucky – our jobs are so focused on dogs and not people, we were able to be socially distant almost immediately," Hennen said.

As the pandemic has worn on, PCDC adapted its drop-off and pick-up procedures over time. At first, no parents or visitors were allowed inside. Eventually, recognizing the importance of parent-teacher communication, the daycare admitted parents after a temperature check, with masks and social distancing.

"We also reduced our hours of operation when we reopened the center," Strege said. "As we felt more comfortable, we added hours to our day to accommodate families' needs. This was beneficial as we learned the best practices for the pandemic and adjusted to our new normal."

Enrollment has been steadily increasing since June. Strege said parents have helped in both recruitment and in keeping the community safe with testing and keeping sick kids home.

Fancy Pants was able to keep all its employees on with the help of a grant to pay them while it was shut for six weeks. Since it reopened, business has been brisk, she said.

"We're busier than ever! I think with so many people working from home, they're really noticing how much their pups smell," Hennen joked.

Housing initiative aims at forging welcoming CommUNITY for All

The Tosa Together community group is partnering with the Opportunity Neighborhoods Program of the Metropolitan Fair Housing Council to find affordable rental housing in Wauwatosa for families.

The key to the program is identifying landlords with 2and 3-bedroom rental units in single- or multi-family properties willing to consider renting to families with Section 8 housing vouchers who are pre-qualified and trained by the Housing Council. Tosa Together will then provide services to the families to help them feel welcome and make connections in Wauwatosa. The Fair Housing Council also provides services and protections for the landlords as well.


This scholarship recognizes a student who best exemplifies the TETNA philosophy: "To provide a welcoming and nurturing environment and to maintain the quality of life and sense of


