

TETNA organizing aldermanic candidate forum

Tosa East Towne is entirely within Wauwatosa's 5th Aldermanic District, and the April 5 election for our district will be a contest between incumbent Rob Gustafson and challenger Sean Lowe. Don't forget to vote! Our polling station is the Firefly Room at Wauwatosa Public Library, 7635 W. North Ave.

TETNA is in the process of organizing a candidate forum similar to the forum that the association hosted before the Common Council elections four years ago. Gustafson and Lowe have agreed to join us on March 16 at 7 p.m. for an event tentatively set to be held at Roosevelt Elementary School. Final details will depend partly on the latest COVID-19 data, and we are working on livestream options as well.

This is not a debate but rather will be a chance for voters to learn more about the two candidates and what they think about issues of interest to the neighborhood. We encourage you to suggest topics you would like us to cover at the forum by emailing info@tosaeasttowne.org, posting on our Facebook event page or tweeting to us at @TETNA or with the hashtag #tosa5th.

Also, be aware that a citywide referendum will ask voters whether Wauwatosa should reduce its Common Council from 16 members to 12. This would create new district boundaries and more, smaller districts, with each district represented by one alderperson. (The city currently has 8 districts, each represented by 2 people.) The referendum also would endorse term limits.





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
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Spring Egg Hunt set for April 9

TETNA plans return of Run Tosa Run to its traditional May race date

The pandemic continued to disrupt normal plans for Run Tosa Run in 2021, but Tosa East Towne Neighborhood Association was able to bring the event back in September, returning racing to the beautiful tree-lined streets of our neighborhood. With proceeds from the 2021 race, the TETNA board approved a \$2,500 donation to Ronald McDonald House Charities Eastern Wisconsin, continuing a longstanding partnership with this worthwhile local organization.

This year, we are planning a return to form and have scheduled Run Tosa Run 2022 on its traditional spring weekend. We hope you will come join us, pending approval of our permit, on Saturday, May 14, to run, walk, volunteer and cheer as we again show

off the best of our neighborhood while promoting some of the businesses along North Avenue.

BelAir Cantina and GRAEF have signed on again as lead sponsors of our eighth annual 5K and kids' run, and online registration is now open. You can find the link at runtosarun. org. The cost to sign up for this year's 5K race is just \$25 through March 15, after which the price increases to \$30. The price after May 1 goes up to \$35.


Our kids' run is a loop of one city block, about a half-mile loop, and geared for runners ages 10 and younger. The cost is \$10.

The 5K men's and women's race winners receive terrific East Tosa prize packages. All 5K runners will

receive race T-shirts and will be entered in a drawing for additional prizes. Kids' run participants each receive a fun toy medal.

Each year in February, Tosa's All-City Read invites the community to gather for book discussions and other events inspired by our annual selection. This year, we read "The Authenticity Project" by Clare Pooley.

Her book imagines what would happen if people had the opportunity to share aspects of their authentic selves with strangers. The medium for this self-expression is a notebook left in a young woman's cafe by an elderly artist who issues the following challenge: "Everyone lies about their lives. What would happen if you shared the truth instead?"

This year's schedule of events, which extends into the middle of March, reflects the interests and occupations of the ever widening circle of characters who are affected by the notebook as it circulates from one person to another. The highlight is a virtual author visit with Clare Pooley, from her home in England, on March 6 from 1 to 2:30 p.m. We are also pleased to present a series of Thursday evening painting classes taught by local artist Fred Bell on Feb. 17, Feb. 24, March 3 and March 10 from 7 to 9 p.m.


As in other years, there are discussions, lectures, workshops and classes based on themes in the book. This year's cooking class, always a popular event, focuses on Chinese cooking. It is scheduled for Feb. 19 from noon to 2 p.m. at Hui's Restaurant, 8820 W. North Ave.

The schedule of events begins with a book discussion on Feb. 7 from 7 to 8:30 p.m. in the Firefly room at the Wauwatosa Public Library and concludes with an afternoon tea at 3:30 p.m. on March 12 at Cafe Blue. Most events are planned for in-person attendance and participation.

Wauwatosa commission advocates for people with disabilities

A mong the commissions and committees working through the City of Wauwatosa is the Commission for Persons With Disabilities. This had been a committee, appointed by each mayor since the passage of the Americans with Disabilities Act in 1990. In 2021, the Wauwatosa Common Council adopted an ordinance that added the committee to the Municipal Code, creating a permanent Commission for People With Disabilities in the process.

The commission is charged with representing the interests of people with disabilities in all aspects of city life. Toward that end, members have been involved with several projects over the past few years. These have included working with the city to purchase five adaptive bicycles to be rented through the bike rental programs approved by the city. Currently, the bikes are being rented from Hart Park through Bublr.

The commission has worked with Wauwatosa East High School to ensure that the new swimming pool is fully accessible. Advocating for accessible housing has also been a major focus of the commission, resulting in commitments from two developers for affordable apartments for people with intellectual and developmental disabilities. Recently the commission has been meeting with

Dr. Means, Wauwatosa's Superintendent of Schools, on forming an independent parent committee to advocate for the needs of students with disabilities in the Wauwatosa schools.

The Commission is comprised of 7-11 members. There are currently 10 members and one vacancy. 


